Celebrating 60 years of independence, India has never left the travel map.

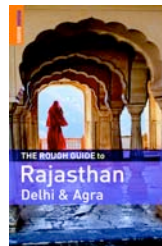
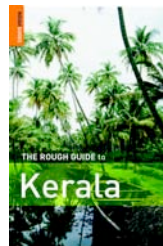
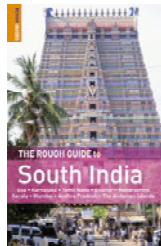
